## STANDING ORDER TO ALLOW FOR TEMPORARY JUDGE POLICY EXCEPTIONS

California Rule of Court 2.818(b) specifies limitations on attorneys acting as court appointed temporary judges. Pursuant to Rule 2.818(b), an attorney may not serve as a court-appointed temporary judge: "(1) If the attorney, in any type of case, is appearing on the same day in the same courthouse as an attorney or as a party; (2) If the attorney, in the same type of case, is presently a party to any action or proceeding in the court; or (3) If, in a family law or unlawful detainer case, one party is self-represented and the other party is represented by an attorney or is an attorney." Subsection (b) also provides that, "[f]or good cause, the presiding judge may waive the limitations of the subsection."

The Superior Court of Santa Clara County has historically relied on attorneys serving as temporary judges to enhance access to timely justice for the public. This reliance is particularly true in the Family Law division of the Superior Court in which temporary judges serve on a number of calendars, including but not limited to the following: Mandatory Settlement Conference, Settlement Officer Conference, Personal Property Binding Arbitration, Default Hearing, and Law and Motion. As of August 16, 2016, most family law related matters are now heard in one courthouse.

Rule 2.818(b) would place undue hardship on the Court's ability to recruit sufficient numbers of temporary judges to adequately serve the public. Based on the above, the Court finds there is good cause to waive the limitations in Rule 2.818(b) 1 and 3 for temporary judges in family law matters. This waiver applies to all family law matters heard by temporary judges in Santa Clara County. SO ORDERED. Dated: 2/22/17 Hon. Patricia M. Lucas Presiding Judge of the Superior Court
